We witnessed unprecedented growth and impact, answering an astounding 501 crisis calls and referrals. This sets a record for the most crisis calls and referrals in a single calendar year. ### our approach

AncoraTN works tirelessly to nurture survivor healing and strategically combat human trafficking in Tennessee. We seek to break cycles of exploitation and support survivors of human trafficking as they heal from their traumas—offering long-term, comprehensive aftercare services. Through educating communities and professionals, advocating for changes in legislation, and implementing prevention programming, AncoraTN works to stop human trafficking before it ever begins.



We provide human trafficking survivors with long-term, comprehensive, specialized, trauma-informed aftercare through residential and community-based services.



We keep vulnerable youth safer and address demand for this crime through 1-on-1 prevention sessions, specialized group facilitation, and equipping our community with the right resources to prevent exploitation.



As experts in the field, we train over 30,000 professionals and community members each year. We equip front-line professionals to identify human trafficking victims and positively impact those within their spheres of influence.



We work successfully at local, state, and national levels to foster strategic collaboration, effective communication, and meaningful legislation to accomplish systemic change.



Survivor aftercare is at the core of AncoraTN's work. We offer individualized and comprehensive support to survivors of human trafficking wherever they are on their healing journey – from the initial stages of crisis stabilization, through healing, and on the path to independence.

Between a record-breaking number of crisis calls and referrals and a fortified partnership with the Tennessee Department of Children's Services, our services for survivors of all ages expanded deep and wide in 2023.



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
## demographics & numbers



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
**47%** increase in call volume from 2022 to 2023

### referral sources




Almost two thirds of our calls were either self or family referral or were through our partnership with the Department of Children Services.

#### "I cannot believe I don't have to worry about where I'm going to sleep anymore. I can turn that part of survival mode off now. I don't have to be scared; I can rest."

AncoraTN's Residential Manager Hannah Rose frequently hears sentiments like this when working with survivors who are staying at the Survivor Restoration Campus (SRC). For the first time, probably ever, survivors feel safe.

2023 was the first full year of residential services at the Campus, providing both a two-bed emergency suite and an 8-bed long-term residential program. Being able to provide safe and stable housing is a vital component to AncoraTN's program. Hannah shared, "You cannot do any type of intense healing until a baseline of need is met. When leaving exploitation, survivors wonder 'Where am I going to sleep? What am I going to eat? Am I going to be safe?" Having these housing options available helps AncoraTN address survivors' key concerns and provide a



place of stability where healing can begin.

Safety is so important, but we don't stop there. Residents have access to healing services such as therapy, support groups, and case management. We also build community, sometimes built in the small, day-to-day moments. For Hannah, these moments can be the most powerful. Over something as simple as the consistency of connecting over a cup of coffee in the morning, she sees connections and community. "When survivors know we're always here, they're safe, and they're cared for, the real change happens..."



It is critical that we not only support survivors of human trafficking but that we also work to prevent exploitation from occurring altogether. Young people in the foster care system, victims of childhood sexual abuse, and those facing food and housing insecurity are more vulnerable to being targeted by traffickers.

AncoraTN seeks to prevent this crime through building safe relationships with youth who are at risk of being exploited through a 4-week interactive curriculum, specialized group facilitation, and equipping our community with resources.

Thanks to an expanded partnership with the Tennessee Department of Children's Services, our youth prevention program experienced rapid growth in 2023. At the end of 2023, we added two new full-time staff – a CSEC Youth Care Coordinator and Prevention Specialist – each of which will be dedicated to serving youth in our community.





We continued to expand our reach statewide through both in-person and online training opportunities. From frontline professionals to engaged community groups, these trainings are tailored for each group to better understand the complexities of human trafficking in our state.

These trainings have been incredibly impactful! We observed a direct link between the increase in individuals trained and the number of crisis calls and referrals we received throughout 2023.

#### advocacy accomplishments

In 2023, AncoraTN successfully advocated for several new laws in the state of Tennessee. These laws promote protections and services for survivors of human trafficking, paired with harsher punishments for their traffickers.

- **Public Chapter 177** established the creation of the Tennessee Businesses Against Trafficking program intended to train business owners to identify, prevent, and combat human trafficking to foster awareness and recognition throughout the state.
- **Public Chapter 359** amended a previous bill, creating an exception that gives victims of human trafficking the right to deny cooperation in an investigation for any health and/or safety reasons that could jeopardize their well-being. It also added victims of human trafficking to the list of those who may be awarded compensation for injury or loss due to pain and suffering.
- **Public Chapter 237** established the creation of a training program emphasizing the dynamics of investigating crimes against children—including appropriate investigative and communication techniques—and for assistant district attorneys prosecuting such cases.
- **Public Chapter 282** gave victims of human trafficking the right to give or revoke consent for advocates and service providers to disclose certain information in legal proceedings, except when a report of abuse is required by law.

### tennessee counter-trafficking alliance

The Tennessee Counter-Trafficking Alliance was formed in 2016, when Grow Free Tennessee (upper East Tennessee), AncoraTN (Middle Tennessee), and Restore Corps (West Tennessee) received requests from state-level officials to expand their services and their service regions so that every county, community, and city in the state of Tennessee would have access to an organization addressing community-specific needs with regard to human trafficking.


This coalition leverages its state-wide influence to advocate for local, state, and national legislation that would cultivate systemic change, positively impacting the lives of survivors while imposing stricter consequences for traffickers.
